# Norwood Elementary and Professional Learning



Our staff has been involved with professional development this spring, and continuing over the summer, to enhance learning for our students. The Ohio Legislature recently passed a law that require school districts to follow best practices for dyslexia support. There is a guidebook developed by the Ohio Department of Education that requires universal screening, interventions, and remediation for children that show signs of dyslexia

Staff in all Kindergarten through 3<sup>rd</sup> grade classrooms have completed extensive training using Wilson Foundation which meets the needs for a multi-sensory program. Additional staff has been completing training with Wilson for a program called “Just Words” which are Tier II interventions for students in grades 4 – 12. In addition, the usage of iReady for Reading (and Math) provides a universal screening and provides us data to identify needed interventions to support all students.

Norwood is adding for the 2022-23 school year additional members to our Care Team which is now called Multi-Tiered System of Support Team (MTSS). We will be including our building Occupational Therapist, Speech Therapist, trained Orton Gillingham teacher, Social Worker. The team currently includes the School Psychologist, Elementary Curriculum Director, and Principal. Our Special Education Director is also involved as needed.

It is our goal to follow Stephen Covey’s “7 Habits” in our daily lives and being proactive with learning is a critical component. Thank you for a great school year and we will continue grow as professionals to support all of our students.


# The Bottom Line

Last month the Board of Education adopted the required update to the District's five-year financial forecast. Under Ohio law school districts are required to pass a five-year forecast of its General Fund in November with an update in May. The Ohio Department of Education and Auditor of State use the submitted forecasts to identify school districts showing signs of fiscal distress. The forecast is also used to drive the District's budget, with appropriations matching forecasted expenditures for the current fiscal year.



The chart below shows the District's forecasted revenues, expenditures, and fund balances over the course of the approved forecast.



Revenue are forecasted to exceed expenditures in the current fiscal year (FY), ending June 30, 2022. The District has a long-standing emergency levy expiring on December 31, 2023. By law, I cannot assume passage of a levy, for either new money or renewal. As a result, that revenue is taken out of the forecast. The emergency levy accounts for nearly 10% of the District's total revenues in FY 2022. Due to taking out this revenue from the forecast the District is forecasting operational deficits starting in FY 2023 and progressively worsening, leading to negative fund balances in FY 2025 and 2026. Including that revenue the forecast improves dramatically, with operational surpluses forecasted in FY 2023 and 2024 and positive ending fund balances throughout the forecast. By law a school district cannot end a fiscal year with a negative General Fund balance. To prevent that the District will either need to increase revenue or decrease expenditures, or a combination of both.



# Substitute Levy: What is it?

On November 8, 2022, the District will have a substitute levy request on the ballot. This is a new type of levy for the District, but one that should not be too unfamiliar in practice. For the past several decades, the District has had an emergency levy in place that raises \$1,452,338 annually for District operations. The money raised from this emergency levy goes toward staff salaries, benefits, utilities, buses, coaches, and all other expenses that it takes to run a school district. Due to prudent fiscal stewardship, the District is **not** asking for a tax increase at this time. Instead, it is proposing a different type of levy that will function as a renewal for existing taxpayers but realize revenue growth due to new construction.

A substitute levy allows a school district to continue collecting the same amount of revenue that is collected by an existing emergency levy. However, it can collect additional revenue on property that is classified by the county auditor as **new construction**. Examples of new construction includes newly constructed residential or commercial property, new additions to existing property, and properties that are coming off of tax abatements. Essentially, it is any property that has not been taxed before. Therefore, existing taxpayers will not see a change in their taxes because of the substitute levy. However, the District will still realize revenue growth due to the new construction being taxed at the same effective tax rate as existing tax payers.

As you know, the Village of West Jefferson and Jefferson Township are seeing major growth, especially industrial growth. In Tax Year 2021 alone there was just under \$8 million worth of new construction valuation net of demolition. Additionally, several properties will be losing their tax abatement status in the next several years. Being able to capitalize on this growth will provide the District with a new and stable revenue stream going forward. Local sources of revenue accounts for 65% of the District’s revenues, highlighting the importance of this levy for the District’s finances. As shown below, including the renewal revenue improves the District’s five-year forecast, resulting in positive ending fund balances throughout the forecast.
